Highlights of District-wide Volunteer requirements:

- These forms must be completed and results of background investigation completed prior to volunteering at NHS.

These forms must be completed and submitted **each school year**.

B.E.A.T. News

What is new in Business, Entrepreneurship and Applied Technology?

First, our new course, Computer Game Design is rolling along with students creating characters, music, and storylines for their games. We also have added Advanced Placement Computer Science Principles which allows students interested in computer science to earn college credit. In addition, Honors JAVA I &2 have also been added to the B.E.A.T. department as elective credits.

Our culinary department has expanded its repertoire by including "Paladar on the Fly" in which advanced students make lunch for faculty and students using whatever ingredients are available that

day. This practice allows students to show off their creativity and problem solving skills.

Business Education continues to provide essential skills in **Personal Financial Literacy** with students forming individual plans for successful lives. Topics include, credit, personal happiness, choice of banks, and investment options. The course has also added a virtual simulation component in which students can apply concepts taught.

Our entrepreneurship classes continue to provide life lessons for students. NHS

Graphics offers products and services in graphic arts. The Nurtury has a full load of 3-4 year old students who are taught with lessons provided by Early Childhood Development high school students. Our Newtek computer repair company just received a large number of iPads that need repair. The Greenery continues to have flower sales, and has branched out to growing vegetables as well.

English Department

Metropolitan Museum Field Trip Brings Together Art and Literature



On October 17, students enrolled in the cross-curricular course **Humanities** and the senior English elective **Modernism and Mythology** visited the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City. Humanities students planned their visit around research for their

final anthology. For this project, students compile existing works of art and literature and create original pieces around a theme or era in history. Topics include Death and Rebirth, Endurance of the Human Spirit, Pop Art, Power, and Cities. Students located works of art to visit, mapped their day, and viewed the works for part of the rich and successful field trip.

Besides being a fantastic opportunity to experience art and the exploration of the human condition from a variety of cultures, the goal of the trip for Modernism and Mythology students was to examine the original art of the Ancient Romans and Greeks as well as the depiction of mythology in other cultures, such as Egyptian and Kongo. Students were expected to photograph the artwork, and they crafted a presentation to the rest of the class, identifying mythological elements found in the different pieces as well as any archetypes. In many cases, students also commented on what personally drew them to the artwork and interpreted how the artist's depiction might differ from the original myth.

Chekhov's Cherry Orchard On Stage

On Wednesday, November 30 students enrolled in senior electives World Literature and Drama Studies will take a trip into New York City to see Anton Chekhov's play *The Cherry*

Orchard. Students in both courses are studying the play through different lenses and the teachers, Ms. Jacqui Kaplan and Mr. Brian Tenney, are bringing the classes together to enrich the students' understanding of the play in the context of history and drama.



For World Lit students, it continues their study into late 19th and early 20th century changes in Russian society after the freeing of the serfs; for Drama Studies students, it exemplifies a breakthrough style of dramatic writing that sought to more closely replicate human speech and blur the lines between comedy and tragedy.

Science Department News

Physics Treasure Hunt



Students in Dr. Malary's physics class played pirates as they used what they have learned about vectors to determine the location of "treasure" (a certificate) that Dr. Malary had placed in some of the surrounding science classrooms.

Students used some given information to plot a course to the "treasure" by drawing vectors on a map of the school. Once their course was approved by Dr. Malary, they left the room to locate the certificates. When they returned they were allowed to plunder a candy bowl, and, yes, they were encouraged to don pirate garb. Arrrrrgggg!



Heat Conductivity

Freshmen scientists in Mrs. Baumgartner's IPES class (Integrated Physical & Earth Science) continued their study of heat. They measured heat conducted through a metal bar from a cup of hot water to cold water. They also investigated how different earth materials heat and cool when exposed to radiation.




Cells & Genetics

Mrs. McConnell's AP Biology students used their knowledge of the cell's cytoskeleton to investigate a case study involving a patient who was experiencing infertility. They ultimately determined that the cause of it was a genetic mutation of the tubulin proteins that compose the cilia lining the fallopian tubes. These cilia did not function properly and were unable to move the ovum from the ovary toward the uterus.



Water Pollution Studies

AP Environmental Science students studied water pollution by modeling how pollutants flow through the ground into groundwater. They then identified the source of the groundwater pollution in a simulation where they had to test water samples from different locations around a fictitious town.





The Career Center is open from 7:00 am-2:30 pm, Monday through Friday. To schedule an appointment with either Mrs. Ragaini or Mrs. Latowicki, please call 203-426-7679. Please contact us if you require further information on anything written below.

The Career Center is a unique environment that has the resources to provide students with help in exploring their post-high school options and careers. It is located in the rear of the Counseling Office. We are committed to working with students to promote self-discovery through real world experiences. Our goal is to aid students in developing a plan for their future.

Students can access college, financial aid or career websites during their free periods or after school in the Career Center. Our computers are also accessible for students to use for schoolwork, during the day, as long as it is during a free period.

Unpaid Learning Experience Program

Formerly known as the NHS Internship Program

This program is open to juniors and seniors interested in exploring a career. The positions may be paid or unpaid. Students are placed in a position based on their interests, availability, and organization's schedule.

Students who meet the program requirements have the experience noted on their transcript. Students are asked to complete an application, work their scheduled thirty hours during the school year, attend a safety training, meet with me, and complete a simple reflection on their experience.

Examples of current placements include Threads Magazine, The Avielle Foundation, Head O' Meadow School, Church Hill Physical Therapy, and Fairfield Equine.

Applications are available in the Career Center and the deadline to submit an application for the current year is **December 15**.

Career Shadows

This program allows juniors and seniors one excused day per semester to spend time in a career field of their interest with a community volunteer. If we do not have a volunteer in a student's particular field of interest, we will attempt to find one. The deadline to apply for a Career Shadow is March 31.

Junior/Senior Project

The Junior and Senior Project class provides the motivated and responsible junior or senior learner an opportunity to distinguish themselves by developing a career-oriented relationship with a community professional in the student's area of chosen interest. Participants are expected to be motivated and self-directed. The program requires that the Junior/Senior Project be an experience unavailable in the traditional classroom. This course counts as a fifth class for seniors and a sixth class for juniors. Examples of projects from past years include:

- Spark Gap and Solid State Tesla Coils: Building working Solid State Tesla Coils
- Character Design: Concept Art for characters in an animated film
- Fahrenheit 451 Audiobook Soundtrack: A soundtrack for the

Fahrenheit 451 audiobook

- No One Will Ever Be as Funny as I Think I Am: An Original Comedy Routine
- An Introduction to CrossFit: Crossfit website and two week beginner's workout program
- Life Haven: Rebuilding a Children's Center at a shelter in New Haven.
- Sandy Hook Memorial: Scale model for Sandy Hook Memorial Park

Regional Healthcare Shadowing Program

Applications are now available for the 2017-2018 school year. This program accepts juniors and seniors interested in exploring healthcare careers. Accepted students shadow healthcare professionals observing and learning about the daily tasks of the job. The goal is for students to learn about different aspects of the industry and to learn about the skills necessary to be successful.

Students are selected based on the date their application was submitted, attendance at an informational meeting in May of their sophomore or junior year, and school attendance (including Advisory).


